DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. Share a time when someone saved the day for you. How did you respond?
2. Have you ever passed up the opportunity to be a hero for someone else? If you could go back and change your actions, what would you do differently?
3. How familiar were you with the parable of the Good Samaritan before Andy's message? In what ways did the message change your perspective on the story?
4. Read Luke 10:25–37. What group of people do you find it difficult to treat like neighbors? What would it look like for you to “*go and do likewise*” for those people?
5. In the parable of the Good Samaritan, Jesus asserts that we love God with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength by loving strangers as we love ourselves. How does that challenge the way you currently approach your relationship with God?
6. What is the best way to keep a healthy balance in life for you and the people you're helping?
7. Is there a person in your life right now, who you can meet a need, pay the price or do what needs to be done? If so, what stands in the way of you taking action? What can you do to be a hero? How can this group support you?

MOVING FORWARD

A hero does what needs to be done. When a hero sees a need that he or she can meet, the hero tries to meet it. When it's obvious what needs to be done, the hero does it. Heroes are helpers. Heroes come through. You can be a hero if you meet a need when you see one. You can be a hero if you know the price and pay it.
